










Inside your mouth

Put your hand on the front of your neck. When you sing you can feel your voice. You are using your voice.

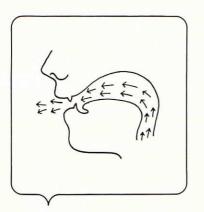
The sound from your voice is coming through your mouth.

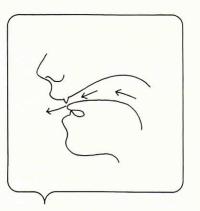

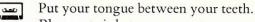


