

We can use infinitive clauses to report advice, requests, orders, etc. Certain reporting verbs (e.g. *tell*, *advise*, *remind*, *beg*, etc.) must be directly followed by an object and an infinitive.

On the other hand, some reporting verbs (e.g. *request, refuse, demand*, etc.) can be directly followed by an infinitive only. When we report something that someone told us not to do, we put *not* between the reporting verb and *to*.

Direct speech	Reported speech			
"Please wait outside," he said.	He <b>told me to wait</b> outside. (reporting verb + object + infinitive)			
"I want to see the manager!" said the man.	The man <b>demanded to see</b> the manager. (reporting verb + infinitive)			
"Please don't eat on the sofa," said Mum.	Mum <b>begged me not to eat</b> on the sofa. (reporting verb + not + infinitive)			

We can also use infinitives with verbs like tell, order, warn or command to report imperatives.

Direct speech	Reported speech
"Be quiet!" said the teacher.	The teacher <b>ordered us to be</b> quiet.
"Don't run on the ice!" Marie said.	Marie warned me not to run on the ice.
